Those who established the Constitution and Bill of Rights most certainly understood the following verses of scripture. "Blessed is the nation whose God is the Lord, the people He chose for His inheritance.'

The Declaration of Independence cited that people have inalienable rights that are God-given, and based on this belief, the rights are not given by government, but are the government's duty to protect. The First Amendment of the United States Constitution states, "Congress shall make no law respecting an establishment of religion, or prohibiting the free exercise thereof, or abridging the freedom of speech, or of the press; or the right of the people peaceably to assemble, and to petition the Government for a redress of grievances." The First Amendment is not to deny Christians the freedom of assembling in public for prayer, but to protect all citizens from the government establishing "a national church". Thus we have the freedom to assemble in public prayer.

The National Day of Prayer is a vital part of our national heritage. Since the first call to prayer in 1775 when the Continental Congress asked the colonies to pray for wisdom in forming a nation, the call to prayer has continued through our history, including President Lincoln's proclamation of a day of "humiliation, fasting and prayer" in 1863. As you look back in history, you tional day of prayer. In 1988 the law was amended and signed by President Reagan, permanently setting the day as the first Thursday of every May. Each year the president signs a proclamation, encouraging

As Americans have watched on television and heard about the war in Iraq, and see what a lack of freedom for the citizens of a country can do, Americans are even more thankful for the freedom they have in America.
