#### **Colorectal Cancer Update**

By Susan Roelfs

Colorectal cancer is the third tobacco, limiting alcohol, meat most common cancer (excluding and high-fat foods and eating at skin cancer) of both men and women in the United States.

The American Cancer Society estimates that about 105,000 new cases of colon cancer and 42,000 new cases of rectal cancer are diagnosis each year.

People may be able to lower their risk of developing colorectal cancer by managing the risk factors that they can control — such as diet, physical activity and to-

bacco and alcohol use. Avoiding

least five servings of fruits and vegetables each day as well as plenty of whole grain foods can lower risk. It is recommended that regular

colorectal caner testing begin at age 50. The tests include: • Fecal occult blood test every
