# No reimbursement is received by firemen for help

### By Karen Krien

Had policy been written differently, Cheyenne County would have received a reimbursement amount for the firemen helping with the 2005 Thanksgiving blizzard.

J.R. Landenberger, St. Francis city superintendent; George Harper, St. Francis fire chief; and Troy Gardner, county sheriff; had recently talked with Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) officials concerning reimbusements for those who had worked during the storm. The county's policy states that firemen are paid \$10 a run for fires and if more compensation is needed, the commissioners will make the decision "case by case." Since the policy didn't specifically say that firemen would be paid in any emergency, the firemen were the only volunteers who were not included in the Federal Emergency Management's reimbursement.

Sheriff Gardner said that his department could not have handled the different situations caused by the storm had it not been for the cooperation and work of the firemen. making sure that road closings were observed. He said firemen also help when there are accidents.

Superintendent Landenberger said the people can count on the firemen no matter what they are paid. But he urged the county to set a policy that would see that they were paid.

He had called several different counties/cities and had figures of what firemen are paid in these areas. They are paid for fires and other emergency calls where they are involved.

In Colby, firemen are paid \$9 for each call and \$9 an hour.
