There is hereby incorporated by reference for the purpose of regulating public offenses within the corporate limits of the City of St. Francis, Kansas, that certain code known as the "Uniform Public Offense Code," Edition of 2009, prepared and published in book form by the League of Kansas Municipalities, Topeka, Kansas. No fewer than three copies of said Uniform Public Offense Code shall be marked or stamped "Official Copy as Adopted by Ordinance No. 562," and to which shall be attached a copy of this ordinance, and filed with the city clerk to be open to inspection and available to the public at all reasonable hours

This amendment to the 2003 Code of the City of St. Francis, Kansas shall be effective upon its publication in the St. Francis Herald.

ORDINANCE NUMBER 564

AN ORDINANCE ATTESTING TO AN INCREASE IN TAX REVENUES FOR BUD-GET YEAR 2010 FOR THE CITY OF ST. FRANCIS

Whereas, the City of St. Francis must continue to provide services to protect the health, safety, and welfare of the citizens of this community; and

Whereas, the cost of providing essential services to the citizens of this city continues to increase

Now therefore, be it ordained by the Governing Body of the City of St. Francis:

Section One: In accordance with state law, the City of St. Francis has scheduled a public hearing and has prepared the proposed budget necessary to fund city services from January 1, 2010 until December 31, 2010.

Section Two: After careful public deliberations, the governing body has determined that in order to maintain the public services that are essential for the citizens of this city, it will be necessary to budget property tax revenues in an amount exceeding the levy in the 2009 budget.

Section Three: This ordinance shall take effect after publication once in the official city newspaper
