She attended normal training in Spearfish, S. D., and received her teacher's certificate. She taught in the rural schools in the area.

In 1935 she married Irl Elliott in Bird City. Shortly after their marriage they moved to California. While in California their first daughter, Beverly was born. After moving back to Bird City a son, Bill and another daughter, Becky

were born.

Maude, Beverly and Bill moved to Florida for a short time during World War II while Irl was in the Navy. After the war was over they returned to Bird City.

During Maude's years in Bird City she was active in the United Methodist Church and American Legion Auxiliary and many other community activities.

She had a great love for her family, friends and life. She maintained her sense of humor and a sharp mind. She always had a story to tell.

Her parents, her brother and infant sister and her husband, Irl preceded her in death.

Survivors are Beverly, Bill and Becky, 10 grandchildren and 25 great grandchildren.

Services will be held Friday, April 30, at 2 p.m. at United Methodist Church. Memorials in her honor may be made to the church or the Bird City Senior Center. Arrangements are being handled by Knodel Funeral Home in Saint Francis.
