

Last free e-waste pick up set for Tuesday in Bird City

karen.k@nwkansas.com An e-waste pick up will be held on Tuesday in both St. Francis and Bird City. The Bird City pick up will be held from 10 a.m. to noon at the city shop. From 12:30 to 2:30 p.m., there will be people at the St. Francis recycling center behind the museum on U.S. 36 helping collect e-waste.

This is the last free e-waste pick up for residents, said Roger Jensen, county representative on the Northwest Kansas Regional Recycling Organization board.

We are urging residents to take advantage of the last free pick up, he said.

While he is not sure just what will be taking place with the e-waste pick up after Tuesday, he said there will be a charge per pound to cover the costs of taking it to Colby where it can be recycled.

The last two years with the free recycling has been a great deal for residents, Mr. Jensen said. A grant had covered the costs of e-waste

an end.

However, during that two-year period, the eight counties involved with the recycling have brought in 200 tons of e-waste items to the Colby center.

Items taken

For years, people have questioned what to do with their old televisions and radios. Then computers came along and practically every family had a computer which was obsolete by the time it was taken out of the box.

E-waste item pick ups are free to households, government offices and educational institutions located in Cheyenne, Decatur, Gove, Logan, Rawlins, Scott, Sheridan and

Thomas counties. There is a charge for items brought in by businesses, organizations and out-of-region recyclers. The charge

is \$5 for computer monitors; \$10 for televisions; \$2 for microwaves or 10-cents a pound per items for all other e-waste items.

Some of the items considered for

recycling but that grant has come to e-waste collection are: computers, parts and accessories, printers, scanners, fax machines, copy machines, telephones, cellular phones, answering machines, televisions, stereos, DVD and VCR players, speakers, radios, tape recorders, satellite receivers. toner and ink-jet cartridges, computer games and rechargeable batteries.

Recyclables repaired

Many of the items brought into the recycling center can be repaired. There is a repairman at the Colby center who has opened up a retail outlet center. There are rebuilt computers, monitors, keyboards, televisions and microwaves, just to name some. Those interested in making a purchase can stop by and check out the items and the great deals.
