karen.k@nwkansas.com On Tuesday, the Cheyenne County Commissioners has scheduled the budget hearing for 9 a.m.

This has been one of the most said Andy Beikman, commissioner.

Earlier in the year, the commissioners discovered there had been a \$340,000 mistake in calculating natural gas taxes. This money had been figured into the budget and, all of a sudden, the county was short. Any expenditures were cut from office supplies to road graders.

Due to lowered natural gas prices decreased by \$9 million.

The commissioners will be approving 82.550 mills or a budget of \$4,736,524 at the budget hearing. This is \$132,899 higher than two years ago, or an average increase of \$66,500 each year.
