was how to remove old photos from the early time magnetic albums. A product called Undu can be purchased and it slides right underneath the photo and lifts it off without tearing the photo.

Photos should never be stored in wooden cedar chests, chest of drawers or boxes. The best place to store them is in metal containers. Trunks are OK as long as they are lined with paper and neutralized. Large photos should be wrapped in acid free tissue paper and the tissue will eventually neutralize the
