As of Dec. 29, the Dead Coyote class had been closed, however, the HEVI-Shot class has been full since Oct. 1.

Callers are coming from Kansas, Colorado and Nebraska as well as Oklahoma, Wyoming, South Dakota, New Mexico, Minnesota, Texas and Missouri. These callers are some of the top callers in the nation!

Peoplewhoarenotparticipating in the event are urged to come to the fairgrounds during check-in on Sunday to see all the teams returning with their coyotes.

It is a good time to talk to the hunters, callers like to swap calling techniques and it is just an interesting event to be a part of. **Two-pointer coyote**

Last year, the two-pointer coyote competition was a success with nine two-pointers killed, Mr. Rueb said. A two-pointer covote is a covote that has a predominately white-tipped tail (80 percent or more white than black). There are very few coyotes that have a white-tipped tail and so this competition is very unique.

Taking first place in the twopointer contest (where the coyote is predominately white) were Cenny Burnell and Dave McCartney, three coyotes, 31.0 pounds; and second, Jerome Humrich and Jason McArthur, two coyotes, 33.6 pounds.

Hunters usually see anywhere from six hairs or more but normally no more than 20 or so in a coyote's tails. A two-pointer, Rueb said, is easily detected and it is very apparent that almost all the hair in the tip of the tail is white. Kill block

A new style of kill block was used last year. It is a "bench mark" in the contest-calling industry. This newly designed kill block dramatically stops the chances of pooling coyotes and cheating.

2011 results

Of the 129 teams participating in the 2011 event, 129 teams returned Sunday for check in. The hunters reported seeing 803 coyotes and killed 364.

Last year's top four winners in the Dead Coyote class were: first place were Matt Hebert, Hyannis, Neb., and Justin Brandon, Yuma, Colo., 14 coyotes; second place: Brad Phillips and Luke Seelhoff, Burlington, 12 coyotes; third place: Cenny Burnell, Kaycee, Wyo., and Dave McCartney, Chadron, Neb., 10 coyotes; fourth place: Josh Mahar and Eric Rice, Gothenburg, Neb., 10 coyotes.

Taking first place in the Hevi-Shot Class were Nick Bowley, Loveland, Colo., and Dustin Patterson, Ogden, with eight coyotes. Second place went to Travis Fonte and Eric Schafer, Wray, seven coyotes; third, Johathan Bopp, Loveland, and Matt Brown, Wellington, Colo., seven coyotes; fourth, Lance Long and Matt Smull, St. Francis, seven coyotes.
