Village administrator, reported that the nursing home had shown a profit of \$1,909 in January. The senior apartments had made \$3,461. Total profit for the month was \$5,370. Brett Poling, commissioner, said he had read where the Good

Samaritan nursing home in Oberlin had made \$132,000. Mr.




