 Oxymorons: Absurdly Logical Quilts, containing 40 examples of quilt making, will be hung throughout the exterior gallery walls while the 100 doll quilts and 50 doll beds from the Mary Ghormley collection, entitled "Pieces of the Past", will be displayed in glass cases and on pedestals throughout the central gallery.
 This exhibit is based upon and interprets an oxymoron — a two word phrase of seemingly contradictory words. These two exhibits, although both of quilts, seem to represent an oxymoron in themselves.
 The exhibit opened on Friday.

Longspur Pheasants Forever group, the hunt is held in late January and is part of the Kansas Hunter Recruitment and Retention Program called "Pass it on".

Parks department offers discounted permits

Anyone wanting to purchase a vehicle permit for Kansas parks may want to buy them before the end of March and save a little money.
 Park permits are \$34.50 if purchased between January and

March, they then go up to \$44.50 from April to September and then go back to \$34.50 in October until December.
 For a second vehicle the price is \$19.50 for the first three months of the year and the last three months.

From April to September it jumps to \$24.50.
 It is the same for seniors or disabled people who purchase the permits. For the first three months and last three months the annual vehicle is \$17.25 and from April to

September it is \$24.50. The second vehicle tag is \$9.75 the first and last three months of the year. In April it goes up to \$12.25.
 Anyone who wants to buy a park permit can purchase it at the Prairie Dog State Park office.
