Board looks at possible projects

were presented to the Norton School Board at Monday night's meeting

Superintendent Greg Mann said the district plans to spend between \$100,000 and \$115,000 from the capital outlay funds. However, the total estimated cost of all the projects together is \$426,350, so the board needs to rank the projects by their importance.

The projects or purchases requested and their estimated costs are:

• Sand and re-paint the Norton High School Memorial Gym floor, \$15,000.

Mr. Mann said the wood in the high school gym was installed in 1991-92 and hasn't been sanded since then. He said sanding is necessary every 12 to 15 years because over time, the floor will start to get rough. Also, the built up finish, which distorts the color of the wood and paint, needs to be sanded off.

• Replace a 12 foot by 120 foot section of concrete in the high school's south parking lot, \$5,600.

Mr. Mann said this was the last section of original concrete and it's

beginning to crack. • Metal siding for the bus barn,

\$3,000. Mr. Mann said the siding that's on the barn is beginning to warp. He's thought about talking to the Norton Correctional Facility about having a prison work crew install the new siding if it is approved.

 Replace roof over Eisenhower Elementary library, \$19,000.

 Replace locker room windows at East Campus, \$11,900.

• Replace East Campus lobby window, \$8,500.

• Repair/replace tennis courts, \$120,000.

The second option is, for all intents and purposes, to build new courts on top of the old ones. This option, which would cost \$120,000, would use the existing asphalt as a sub-base, would be higher than the courts are now, and could last 25 to 30 years.

The third option is for a thin asphalt overlay, which would cost around \$72,000. This is the least desirable option.

Mr. Mann said the district and the city will be discussing different options and possibilities concerning the courts. Although the courts are used by the school district nine weeks out of the year for their tennis season, they belong to the city.

• Construct a handicap bath and dressing room at Eisenhower Elementary, \$8,300.

• Install a 5 foot by 85 foot sidewalk at the Eisenhower Elementary playground, \$1,800.

Eisenhower Principal Larry Hillman said the sidewalk would be at the south end of the school and would go from the playground to the bathrooms. This is the only exit at the school without a sidewalk.
