In 1933, she and Fred Hawk were married in Norton. They lived in Missouri before moving back to Hill City. They moved to Lenora in 1964, and back to Norton in 1970. Mr. Hawk was a blacksmith, farmer and plumber.

Mrs. Hawk was a stay-at-home mother while her children were young but after they left home she studied to become a certified nurse's aide and a medication aide. Mrs. Hawk loved her work at the nursing home and worked well past retirement age before finally

quitting her job.

The Hawks loved to travel and were able to visit South Dakota, California and Washington. Mr. Hawk died in 2001.

The quilts are in and what a grand example of quilting diversity.

From Renegade Quilts, LLC comes forty fabulous art pieces brought to life from fabric, imagination and talent. Measuring ap-

proximately two feet wide by three feet tall, these quilts represent a new level in fabric art. Whether appliqued, silk screened, burned, fused, laminated, hand painted, photo transferred, tied, or machine or hand-stitched, the results from

these contemporary quilt artists is astounding. Using silk noil, cotton, nylon, interfacing, duct tape, mesh plastic bags, and even landscaping fabric, each artist interprets an individual oxymoron in unique colors, elaborate designs,

and well-executed techniques. These absurdly logical quilts are sure to stimulate ones creativity.

Then look for a bit of nostalgia with Ghormley's collection of one-hundred doll quilts in designs and patterns from today and yesterday. These pieces of the past may measure a mere five inches or date back to the mid-1800s. Many embellish antique doll beds in patterns such as Pyramids, Log Cabin, Crazy, Trip Around the World, Pinwheel, Hit and Miss, Grandmother's Flower Garden, Birds in the Air, and Yo-Yo.
