## Walk Kansas team deadline Feb. 27

It's time again to begin forming teams for this year's Walk Kansas program. The program runs from March 14 to May 8.

The fee to register is \$5 per person. This year registrations will be due on Friday, Feb. 27, so you will need to act quickly and contact the County Extension Office to pick up a captain's packet for your team. T-Shirt orders (also \$5 per person) will be due at this time as well. There will be a one-time only shirt order, so please be prepared to turn this order in at the same time as your team registration.

You need to recruit five others to make a six-member team, who will collectively walk 423 miles — the distance across Kansas. "The patrol ... has zero percent hicles as they could to see if everytolerance in this area," he said.

"Motor vehicle crashes are the leading cause of death for children up to age 18," Lt. Griffiths wrote. "For the years 2000 through 2002, 256 children died in Kansas as a result of traffic crashes. Of these, the lieutenant suspects that some only 25 percent were properly restrained or utilized child safety restrictions.'

Last year during National Child Safety Awareness Week, troopers parked near Oberlin Elementary School and stopped as many ve-keep the kids safe every day.
