In the 8th chapter of the book of Nehemiah we read of the Israelites, returned from their exile in Babylon, standing for hours in the city square to hear God's Word read to them. As they listen, they raise their hands and say, "Amen, Amen." and they weep with joy to hear the Word of God and to have it explained to them so they can un-

These same people, in some cases their parents or grandparents, had been sent into exile because they broke God's Law. They were such hypocrites, going to

the temple, praying and making sacrifices so every one could see them, then cheating the poor and living lives filled with

You've heard the old adage, "absence makes the heart grow fonder. Seventy years of exile must have been enough to make the Israelites realize what they'd been missing, to make them understand God had given them His Law be-

cause they were chosen. Sometimes I wonder if we have become like the ancient Israelites. I wonder if we realize how special it is to have God's Word available to us or if we take access to the Bible, and to worship, for granted. If you listen to a member of the Gideons talk about the hunger they witness for God's Word throughout the world, the eagerness with which it is received, maybe you'd think about how blessed we are to have access to it in our

homes and churches. There are all sorts of tools we can use to help us understand what we read. The Bible has been published in many different translations, some old and familiar, some newer and much easier to understand, in more modern language. There are Bible dictionaries and Bible commentaries and concordances and Bible maps, all things to help us take in what God wants us to learn.

Not all Christian denominations utilize the Bible in the same way. Over the thousands of years of oral tradition and written words some feel it is possible that people may

have made changes. The one thing we know has remained constant in all of time is God, God's Law and God's Truth.

The people of ancient Israel wept to hear God's Word — they'd been without it for far too long. I have found peace, found questions, found answers, and have wept while reading the Bible. I remember having tears come to my eyes one night as I read Romans 5:8 — read that God loved **me** so much that He sent His Son to die for me while I was still a sinner. It was like a light bulb going on, or maybe like a light in the darkness. Suddenly I "got it", I understand that nothing equals, or even compares to the love of God for ALL of God's children. That's the impact God's Word can have on people.

Like every other book, the Bible is full of words. But, in all the world, there are no more wonderful words than those in the Bible.

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
