elcome to Norton and Norton County, an area which has grown from a stagecoach depot amidst the rolling plains in the 1800s into the home of some 5, 800 people.

The region is rich in history as legendary folks like Horace Greeley, Buffalo Bill Cody and Billy The Kid traveled through the area, not to mention the countless Indian tribes that once roamed the prairies.

While Norton has grown substantially since its formative years in the early 1870s, reminders of the past flourish throughout the area.

A detailed replica of the stagecoach stop, Station 15, can be found at Roadside Park on U.S. 36 in Norton. Complete with furniture, decor, mannequins and clothing depicting the era, Station 15 provides visitors with a quick trip through history.

At Prairie Dog State Park, about four miles west of Norton on U.S. 36, there is an adobe house. This is the only earthenwalled structure in Kansas on its original location. Now preserved as a museum, the house was constructed in the 1890s out of a mixture of mud and straw.

Also on the grounds of the state park is the Hillmon School, the sixth school district to be organized in Norton County. Constructed in 1886, this one-room school house was also

elcome to Norton and Norton used for church services, funerals, weddings county, an area which has grown and many other community activities.

Both the Adobe House and the Hillmon School can be viewed year round.

If it's history you enjoy, visit Norton's "Gallery of Also Rans" on the mezzanine of the First State Bank. The exhibit features photographs and biographies of unsuccessful presidential candidates. The brainchild of Norton Banker W. W. Rouse in 1965, the "Gallery of Also Rans" is one of the few galleries of its kind. In 1972, the Smithsonian Institution added a similar exhibit, paying tribute to those who ran for president and lost.

Newcomers and visitors to the city and county can also enjoy several major events throughout the year. In March, Norton holds the annual Tri-State Antique Toy and Sport Card Show. June is a busy month with the Lenora Jubilee, the Almena Celebration and the Sunflower Pioneer Power Association Antique Thresher Show, which is in Almena. In July, the county offers the annual Carp Derby at the Keith Sebelius Reservoir, the Fourth of July Fireworks Spectacular at Prairie Dog State Park and the county fair, which includes a home-owned and locally run carnival in Norton. A large arts and crafts fair is offered in November.

COUNTY CLERK

For voter registration, go to the clerk's office on the second floor. The office is open from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. Monday-Friday.

COUNTY TREASURER

To pay for vehicle registration and tags, pay property taxes or renew an in-state driver's license, go to the county treasurer's office on the second floor.

The office is open for driver's license renewal from 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. Tuesday-Friday, for vehicle business from 8 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. Monday-Friday, and for everything else from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. Monday-Friday.

The closest place to get a new Kansas driver's license is Phillipsburg.

The Kansas Department of Motor Vehicles is at 425 F Street in the Community Building in Phillipsburg and is open from 7-11 a.m. and 1-5 p.m. Tuesday-Friday. For information call (785) 543-5594.
