mostly immunized despite state statistics that Kansas youngsters are poorly prepared to combat childhood diseases.

Frack met with county commissioners on Monday to give them the results of a immunization assessment taken on March 16.

The assessment, of 50 children from 2 years to 35 months, showed that 94 percent of the county's children were fully immunized.

Fully immunized children have had four shots for diphtheria, tetanus and pertussis; three for hepatitis B; one for measles, mumps and rubella; and three for haemophilus influenza type b; and three doses of polio vaccine.

While Norton is doing well in immunizing its youngsters against childhood illnesses, the state and the rest of the country are not.

• Received a letter Mrs. Frack has sent out to legislators reviewing the expenses of the family planning program, which is supposed to be paid for by the Kansas Department of Health and Environment. The program loses about \$272 per patient and costs the county \$21,783 a year. But, Mrs. Frack said, it saves the state money on unwanted pregnancies, sexually transmitted diseases, breast cancer and similar problems. In her letter she asks the state to help pay more of the expenses of this program.
