Democrat plans to run for house

Bob Strevey, rural Norcatur, has filed for the Democratic nomination to the 120th Legislative seat in the Kansas House of Representatives, representing northwest Kansas.

Mr. Strevey and his wife Kay have three married daughters. He is a veteran of the Vietnam War, a retired teacher and a farmer-stockman.

"I appreciate the difficulties facing our legislators during these times of economic hardship and drought," Mr. Strevey said. "When finances are tight, we must set careful priorities. I feel we should put programs that care for people such as schools, nursing homes, and the disabled at the top of our list. Programs that are for capital improvements such as new buildings, roads and research should be delayed until more funds are available.

"Borrowing to pay current bills is poor policy. We should either raise the taxes or cut the programs but it's not right to make our grandchildren pay for what we spend. It's also unwise to cut state income taxes


