"THERE IS HOPE"

1 John 1:9 "If we confess our sins, He is faithful and just and will forgive us our sins and purify us from all unrighteousness."

There are many in this world who live a life that would leave a black mark on tar paper. Some have lived that type of lifestyle so long that they feel there is no hope for change. Even if they could change they are convinced it wouldn't make any difference.

However, as we examine God's Word there is encouragement. When a sinner lays his sins at the foot of the cross with a repentant heart, he will discover that his life is not futile and his failures are the traditional route that our Lord walked from Jerusalem to Mount

Having Jesus Christ as a personal Savior and Lord puts "born again" Christians under His atoning blood. Their sins are never remembered against them again. They have a fresh clean start.

God has a way of taking the years of past experiences, both bad and good, and using them to help Christians fulfill the calling God has placed before them.

I have seen people who have developed their Godgiven talents and abilities to serve their own self-interests and then after receiving Jesus Christ, use those gifts to serve God. Therefore God making the proceeding years useful.

Calvary on the day of His crucifixion. A condemned criminal in Jesus' day was forced to carry the crossbar of his own cross to the place of execution. It was a one-way journey, no turning back! Christians sing a song entitled "I Have Decided To Follow Jesus." In this song is a verse that says "The cross before me and the world behind me." Jesus said if anyone wants to be His disciple, he must take up his cross and follow Him daily. That means Christians do not set their desires and wills against the claims Christ has on their lives. Christians need to be reminded of what Jesus did for them. They should look forward with great anticipation of someday running into the arms of Jesus, which have nailed scarred hands, and touching the body that bears the marks for their sins.

There is hope for the hopeless, because Jesus died on the cross, then three days later rose from the dead, making the lives of those who trust in Him as Savior and Lord, not futile nor are their failures


