healthy handful. How many nuts are in a handful?

It differs for each type of nut, and here is what you consider as a handful: Almonds, 20-24; Brazil nuts, 6-

8; cashews, 16-18; hazelnuts, 18-20; macadamias. 10-12; peanuts, 28; pecans, 18-20 halves; pine nuts, 150-157; pistachios, 45-47; and walnuts, 14 halves. For these results, all of the nuts should be unsalted and un-roasted or dry roasted. It's easy to nibble on nuts. Here

are some ideas you may want to consider: Store shelled or unshelled nuts in

an airtight container in your refrigerator for up to six months or for a year in your freezer for best quality.

You don't have to fire up the stove or get out your cookbook to enjoy nuts. Your handful of nuts may be enjoyed out of hand.

Divide a container of nuts into small snack bags for easy snacking at home, office or on the road. Simply count or grab a handful of nuts and store in individual snack bags. Keep in the refrigerator until you're ready to enjoy. A handful of nuts may help you resist that gooev sweet roll in the break room
