Disaster deadline is near

The deadline for the U.S. Department of Agriculture and Farm Service Agency's Non-insured Crop Disaster Assistance Program for oats, aquaculture, canola, Christmas trees, nursery crops, speltz, and turf grass sod is Sept.

Crop eligible for program benefits are limited to those not insurable in the county and are produced for food or fiber. Included as eligible crops are floricultural, ornamental nursery, Christmas trees, turf grass sod, industrial crops, seed crops, aquaculture (including ornamental fish), and forage crops for livestock (mechanically harvested or grazed).

Farmers and ranchers, who wish to participate in the program, must visit their local Farm Service Agency office to complete an application for coverage and pay the service fee by the sales closing date for the specific crop.

This coverage entitles producers to a payment of 55 percent of an average market price for the commodity if a natural disaster caused a 50 percent production loss or greater.

Farmers and ranchers are limited to \$100,000 in benefits per person per crop year; they must not exceed the \$2 million gross revenue provisions; and they must comply with conservation compliance provisions in order to be determined eligible.

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
