Race fans were treated to double features in three of the four divisions at Elmwood Park Speedway July 17, as make-up features were run in the IMCA-sanctioned Hobby Stock, Stock Car and Modified classes after rain moved in during the last race program, postponing these three feature

The IMCA Hobby Stock makeup feature was the first on the track for their 15-lap race. Rhett Kingsbury of Smith Center took the lead at the drop of the green, but 8th starting Cory Struckhoff of Kensington got by Kingsbury on lap 3 to take the lead. Point leader Wade Wagenblast of Deshler, Neb., worked his way to second by lap 5 and challenged Struckhoff for the lead but cut a tire down and stopped on the track on lap 9, bringing out a caution. Struckhoff held the point the remaining distance for the win with Kale Shank finishing second, followed by Kelly Karnopp, Wagenblast, and Kingsbury. The regular feature had a harder
