"How To Walk On Water", By Jerry Cummings, pastor of Living Hope Fellowship in Norton

The Seasons of our Lives

In Matthew 14 we read a story about what the power of God can do, as well as what a man can do through the power of God. It is the story of Jesus and Peter walking on the water. The story

begins as Jesus sends the disciples away in a boat while he proceeds up the mountain to pray alone through the night. But while Jesus is praying, the disciples are having a hard time rowing their boat into a strong opposing wind. They make it to about the middle of the lake (3-4 miles) in 7-8 hrs. Somewhere between 3 and 6 in the morning they see a figure walking toward them on the

water. After recover-

ing from their fright,

they realize it is Jesus. One of the most interesting things about this story is Peter's reaction to seeing Jesus walk on the water. If it were one of us, we might have been satisfied, like the other disciples, to simply sit in amazement of what Jesus was doing. But Peter, apparently remembering how Jesus had included them in his other miracles such as feeding the 5,000, healing the sick, casting out demons and so on. So Peter wanted to be a part of them as well. So he asks Jesus to tell him to come to Him on the water. And of course Jesus was pleased with Peter's request and says "Come". Then Peter

got out of the boat and

began to walk on the

water to Jesus. Also, as we know, Peter began to fear, and his faith wavered, and he had to be rescued by Jesus.

In spite of Peter's weakness I admire him as one who wasn't

satisfied with just boat riding, but wanted to walk on water once he saw it as a possibility through God's power. The boat was the natural security of the disciples, their comfort zone. But this is a place also of limitation. Out on the water, Jesus was walking in a place that was unlimited, where all things are possible.

You see Peter knew that if Jesus told him to "Come", then it could be done. So Peter really was not just walking on water, but on the word "Come". When he began to sink, it wasn't just that he lost sight of Jesus, but he lost sight of "Come". Indeed, every word that is spoken to us by God, if we will receive it, has power in it for us to do what He says, even the impossible.

I believe that Jesus is still looking for people who will not settle for the ordinary limitations, but will call out to the one for whom nothing is impossible to command us to "Come". He is looking for a people who will believe for the impossible in a world of limitations. Can you hear Him speaking to your heart

As late August approaches, we might feel an occasional cool breeze some evenings or notice a lone leaf letting go as it drifts to the still warm ground. The poet, Oliver Wendell Holmes, expressed it this way... "The foliage has been losing its freshness through the month of August, and here and there a yellow leaf shows itself like the first gray hair amidst the locks of a beauty who has seen one season too many."

Certainly, Autumn is not far behind. Soon the trees will be ablaze with glory. The mountains will change from green gowns into those of red and orange and gold. Summer will surely not leave without her annual encore.

Such are the "seasons" of our lives. Whether our days are bright with color or the days are gray and cold, God is there for us. After all, as the creator of the four seasons, doesn't He intend for our lives to mirror those seasons somewhat? When we trust Him in all circumstances, the Creator will attend to our human transitions as well. "Be urgent in season and out of season." [2 Timothy 4:2]

Won't you learn more about God's unfailing love as you worship Him this week? We must make our preparations now for the seasons of our lives.
