Superintendent Greg Mann gave Norton Junior High School Principal Larry Mills' report because he was unable to be at the meeting. Mr. Mann said the junior high has 109 students enrolled. Two new teachers have been hired to cover the vacant positions of an art teacher and an at-risk tutor.

He said the junior high sports teams all have a good number of students involved.

Eisenhower Elementary Principal Larry Hillman said things have gone well so far. He said they have a head count of 351 and a full time equivalency of 326 and are anticipating that number to go to 327.


