• Heard from Chief Financial Officer Brian Carlton that the hospital's statistics will be done on the Dairyland system in a couple of months. Now, he said, getting the hospital's statistics is a time consuming process that is done, primarily, by the department su-

Mr. Carlton said in September, the hospital had 336 patient days, Director of Nursing Georgia making 1,096 for the year. He said, compared to previous years, the hospital is busier.
