Arthur Wudtke was 20 when he was drafted. He served from July of 1942 to April of 1946.

He started out in the medics attached to the Air Corps, and then after the Battle of the Bulge, was transferred to infantry.

Mr. Wudtke started training Jefferson Barracks in St. Louis, Mo., and was transferred to Randolph Field in Texas where he went to school for aviation

medicine.

When he was finished with his schooling, he went back to Jefferson Barracks, where he started giving physicals to pilots.

"This was when they were losing so many pilots in Europe and the Pacific," he said.

In February of 1944, he was transferred to Chanute Field in Illinois.

When the Battle of the Bulge happened in November 1944, he was sent to be a rifleman in the infantry.

Training lasted for six weeks. He went to Fort Meade in Baltimore, then New Jersey and then he was shipped to Europe.

"I wasn't in any big battles," he said. "I only saw about two months of combat in Germany."

Mr. Wudtke fought in the 14th Armored Division. After the war was over, he said he spent about a month in a small town in Germany and then went to Munich.

"I didn't have enough points to go home," he said. "So when the 14th was shipped back, I was transferred to the 10th Armored Division. I was there for about three weeks when they went

I still didn't have enough points so I was transferred to the 9th Infantry Division and then to the 71st. I came home with them.

He said his homecoming was nothing unusual because it was about 10 months after the war ended. For two months after he got home, he didn't really do anything.

Then he went back to work for Columbia Steel Tank in Kansas City, where he was working before he was drafted. Mr. Wudtke ended up working for them for 38 years and retired in

He said he was raised in the area, but left in 1941 when he couldn't find a job.

He came back in March of 2001 after his wife died in 1999. He has two brothers and two sisters who live here.

He married his wife Elaine in 1948. They had one daughter. He has two grandchildren, one boy and one girl.
