Wildlife, Parks to stock trout throughout season

anglers get the opportunity to fish for a tasty species that isn't native to the state—rainbow trout. The Kansas Department of Wildlife and Parks stocks rainbow in waters throughout the state, offering a special angling opportunity for both novice anglers and seasoned fly fishermen.

Anyone fishing for trout in these waters from Oct. 15 through April 15 must purchase a \$11 trout permit. In addition, all residents 16 through 64, and non-residents 16 and older, must have a valid fishing license.

Two new areas, Pratt Centennial Pond and Topeka Auburndale Park Stream, have been added to the program this year. Trout fishing feedbacks@wp.state.ks.us.

It's that time of year again, when Kansas at Mined Land Wildlife Area No. 30 (Cherokee County) and Tuttle Creek Reservoir Seep Stream, where trout survive through the summer, requires a trout permit year-around. Smoky Gardens at Goodland will not receive trout until rains fill the lake. Two areas — Kanopolis State Park Pond and Glen Elder Stilling Basin — no longer stock trout.

Trout will be stocked throughout the state during this season. Check the stocking schedule under "Fishing" on the KDWP website, www.kdwp.state.ks.us stocking dates and

Water level — Reservoir is 17.5 ft low due to drought.

Hunting conditions — Similar to last year. Few shallow areas. No flooded vegetation.

Expected hunting success — Poor

Oct. 9-Jan. 4 & Jan. 22-Jan. 30. Refuge boundaries will be the same as last year and are in effect Nov. 1 -March 1. A small craft ramp is located at the Horse shoe camping area to provide boat access at the west end of the lake.

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
