Littlest Jays are undefeated champions

The Norton sixth grade football team is the undefeated champion of the Western Kansas Football League and the National Youth Sports Sanctioning Organization Midwest States Tournament.

The Norton team completed a perfect 12-0 season, which followed the team's 9-0 record and league championship a year ago as fifth graders to compile a perfect 21-0 record for the two seasons.

The team is the only one in the history of the league to go two years undefeated and win back-toback league championships.

Last Saturday and Sunday, the Blue Jays competed in the Midwest States Championship Tournament in Lawrence with 15 other teams from Kansas, Nebraska, Iowa and Missouri. To qualify for the tournament, each team had to have finished first or second in their league.

In round one on Saturday, the young Blue Jays defeated the No. 1 seed Wichita Bulldogs 19-18 in an exciting triple overtime game. The Bulldogs were the two time defending state and tournament champions. They are also the Greater Wichita Football League Champions.

This is the second time the Norton team has won a triple overtime game. Last season, they defeated the Hays Falcons in three overtimes to win their first league championship.

In round two on Saturday, the Junior Jays played the Blue Valley Tigers. After falling behind 6-0 in

The post-season league tournament was held at Lewis Field Stadium in Hays. In the first round on Oct 24, Norton shutout Medicine Lodge 49-0. In the second round on Oct. 30, the young Blue Jays blanked the Hays Falcons 27-0. The championship game was held on Oct. 31 and Norton defeated the Hoisington Cardinals 27-13.

Winning the Midwest States championship qualified Norton for a berth in the national tournament but the team chose not to compete for the national championship.

The young Blue Jays outscored this season's opponents 354 to 68 which is an average of 29.5 to 5.7 points per game, less than a touchdown.
