School to return payments

The Norton School Board is giving back part of a health insurance refund to

At last Monday's meeting, Superintendent Greg Mann said the district got a \$151,000 refund check from Blue Cross/ Blue Shield.

"We've been really lucky with our insurance in the past several years," he said.

To figure out how much of the refund the teachers would get, he said he took the total premium, subtracted what the board paid and then figured out what each teacher paid for their plans. He said teachers who are eligible to get the refund are those who were members of the group from Oct. 1, 2003, through Sept. 30, 2004, the period the refund covers.

He said the teachers share was 42.3 (Continued on Page 5)

It's little, yellow and used as a reference for phone numbers, but the latest issue of the Southwestern Bell Norton-area phone book is missing something. In fact, it's missing several somethings — phone numbers.

depending on each teacher's plan. Mr. Mann said he would like to give the refunds with the November checks.

The remaining amount, which goes back to the district for its contribution to the insurance plan, is a little over \$91,000.

Mr. Mann said the district could put the money in capital outlay or another special fund, but not in the general fund or local option budget; could return the money to Blue Cross Blue Shield to buy down future rate increases; or could use the money for a future self-insurance program.

Board member Jeff Nielsen asked if they should give the money back to the teachers like they did last year.

Mr. Mann said they did that last year because it was a much smaller refund where some of the teachers would only be getting back a very small amount and the district thought it should supplement those refunds with the rest of the money. This year's refund is much bigger, he said.

Board member Elaine Lofgreen said she was of two minds about it. "We fulfilled our obligation to the teachers by paying their part of

the insurance plan," she said. "But at the same time, we told them we would pay a certain amount and this refund is part of that amount and so should go to the teachers."

Board members Gary Lacy and Chris Harting both said that the board fulfilled its obligation and that it should keep the money for something needed.

Mr. Mann said the \$91,000 will just about cover the price of a mobile computer lab, which the district will need sometime in the near

The board decided to give the teachers the 42.3 percent refund with the November pay checks, but decided to wait and think about what to do with the board's por-

In other business, the board: • Was given a priority grid for

what to do with the remaining Tansill Trust money that had been earmarked for construction. Mr. Mann asked the board members to fill it out and return it to him.

Mr. Harting said he feels that money it doesn't need to spend it
