Healthy eating doesn't have to be bad eating

 Our family copes with several special diets and we've developed "DD" recipes. Originally this meant "designed for diabetes" but as the years have gone by more and more of us not only need but en-

joy and look forward to these dishes. Maybe they can brighten a holiday meal for someone you know, too. Tell those who need to know but don't advertise too widely. The others will be eating healthy and will probably never realize it.

DD SUGAR-FREE PUMPKIN PIE

- 1 frozen 9-inch deepdish low fat piecrust
- 1 15-oz can plain pumpkin
- 1 12-oz can fat-free evaporated milk
- 2 beaten eggs or equivalent egg substitute
- 18 packets Equal or one cup Splenda
- 1 teaspoon cinnamon
- 1/2 teaspoon ginger
- 1/4 teaspoon cloves

Set piecrust to thaw on a cookie sheet. Mix all other ingredients until smooth and pour into crust. Slide cookie sheet into oven before adding last cup to avoid slopping.
 Bake at 425 degrees for 15 minutes, turn down to 350 degrees and bake 30 more minutes until a table knife inserted in center comes out clean. Serve with fat free whipped topping.

DD FRESH CRANBERRY RELISH

- 1 bag dark red cranberries
- 1 large very red Delicious apple
- 1 large orange, peel and all
- 1 small box raspberry sugar-free jello
- 1 small box orange sugar-free jello
- About 1/2 cup Splenda

Grind the first three ingredients together or process in food processor. Stir the dry jello powder thoroughly into this mixture. Add a small amount of Splenda (or Equal), taste and add more a little at a time until it is the degree of sweetness you prefer. Cover and refrigerate. Serve cold in your prettiest clear glass dish.
 It can be served as a fresh salad or may be combined with some chunky pineapple and fat free whipped topping to create a creamy alternative.
 I always double this because it is popular, keeps well and leftovers are great on a scoop of low-fat vanilla ice cream.

DD LOW-CAL CREAMY DRESSING

- 1 pint Hellmann's low-fat mayo
- 1/2 cup Splenda
- 1 cup low-fat sour cream
- 1/4 cup white or rice vinegar
- 3 tablespoons spicy mustard
- Pinch salt, lots of fresh ground pepper

Combine and stir until very smooth. Keeps well under refrigeration. MUST use real Hellmann's brand in this or it will not turn out right. Great on coleslaw or lettuce.
 Can be converted to ranch or blue cheese dressing. For ranch, leave out sugar, add two tablespoons Worcestershire or soy sauce, a teaspoon each of garlic and onion powder (not salt), a tablespoon of dill and increase the pepper a bit. For blue cheese dressing add to this mixture two or three spoonfuls of well-drained, large curd, low-fat cottage cheese and stir to blend.
