Residents of Almena and surrounding communities have been filling their automobiles up with fuel for close to half a century at the gas station. But during the past two years, customers have also been able to fill their bellies with home-cooked meals thanks to owners Nicci and Tracy Stutsman, who serve lunch specials daily and are now known for their special entrees on Friday nights.

The couple actually met in the food industry while working at The Old Spaghetti Factory restaurant in Kansas City in 1992. Nicci graduated from Kansas State University with a major in hotel and that Home Oil presented when we

They decided to start serving their gas station customers meals at noon in March of 2002.

What began as lunch specials only has grown to catering special occasions, and serving dinner on Friday nights as well. Thus, Home

Nicci plans the menu and uses her from family and friends.

"I would describe our meals as

home style — but sometimes with a twist," she said.

She cooks anything from roast beef sandwiches to meat loaf, pulled pork sandwiches or enchiladas for lunch. Tracy focuses on cooking the Friday night prime ribs on their gas grill and smoker.

"The prime ribs are kind of what we're being know for," said Nicci.

But there is always another choice of entree on Fridays, such as chicken cordon-blue or fettuccini.

The portions at Home Oil are always generous, and Nicci serves her home-made cheesecakes on Friday evenings for dessert.

"I usually prepare at least two different cheesecakes, one New York style (plain) with seasonal toppings and another flavor like Butterfinger or Brownie," she said.

If cheesecake doesn't satisfy the sweet-tooth then a slice of pie, made from scratch by Nicci's mother Liz Howard, will.

Owning their own restaurant is a lot of work, but also provides a lot of joy and satisfaction, they say.

"Our boys see it as their second home," said Nicci of her two sons Matthew, 8, and Nicholas, 3.

Nicholas stops in every morning to have a slice of hot bread and Matt helps out in the garage.

As customers dine amid the hardware supplies of Home Oil, the Stutsmans remain the real nuts and bolts of the operation as they continue to serve food for Almena's residents.



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
