Hospital computer system assisting medical staff, office

The Norton County Hospital is getting a new computer system.

The new Dairyland Information System, which will allow the hospital to do more with computers for everything from X-rays to billing, is being installed with only a few glitches.

Chief Financial Officer Brian Carlton said at Wednesday night's hospital board meeting that the system is up and working in the clinical departments, including the lab, X-ray, physical therapy and respiratory therapy. Now, these departments can send and receive orders and results.

He said that doctors, nurses and their helpers will be putting orders on the computers to go directly to the labs. As soon as the hospital gets a few more machines, the doctors will be able to enter orders from their offices.

Being able to send orders to the various departments has made things much faster, he said. Now, rather than waiting for a fax with orders for lab or X-ray, those departments get the orders by computer and can get right on it.

Mr. Carlton said the nursing staff is getting up to speed as fast as they can.

Trainers from Dairyland have been helpful, he said, even arriving at the hospital at 3 a.m. to train the night staff.

The staff is checking all statements to make sure they are correct, he said, so this is slowing the billing a little right now.

Hospital Administrator Rich Miller said he has the utmost respect for the staff right now.

"For them to learn the system and then go live with the patient load we have is just amazing," he said. "Everybody is really doing their share."
