City gets insurance refund

It pays to have insurance. At least it does if you're a small or mid-sized city belonging to the Employers Mutual Insurance Co. group.

Jon Boxler with Boxler Insurance Agency recently gave the City of Norton a check for \$5,084.61 as its share of a refund from the company's Kansas Municipal Utilities Safety Group.

He said he also gave refunds to Almena, Norcatour, Brewster, Herndon and Winona.

He said that 60 percent of Kansas cities are in the insurance group.

Mr. Boxler said Employers Mutual made the safety group program to return savings to cities and others, like school districts, to give them purchasing power.

The savings, he said, is based on the proportion of premiums paid by the participating group, which, in this case, is Norton.

"Over the years it's been a good program for the towns we have who are involved with this," he said. "The savings has been substantial. The program is tailored to the needs of smaller towns."

He said the program doesn't apply to larger towns, because they have problems and safety issues that the smaller communities don't have.

Mr. Boxler said other agents across the state insure their communities with the company. But, he said, the agencies have a choice in who they use. He said he uses Employers Mutual because, he feels, they offer the best program for small and mid-sized communities.

He said his agency has been with Employers Mutual since 1931 and was one of two the company started out with.
