"Evil Is Crafty", by Rev. Lew Van Der Wege

Now the serpent was more crafty than any other wild animal that the LORD God had made. He said to the woman, "Did God say, 'You shall not eat from any tree in the garden'?" The woman said to the serpent, "We may eat of the fruit of the trees in the garden; but God said, 'You shall not eat of the fruit of the tree that is in the middle of the garden, nor shall you touch it, or you

not die; for God knows that when you eat of it your eyes will be opened, and you will be like God, knowing good and evil." So when the woman saw that the tree was good for food, and that it was a delight to the eyes, and that the tree was to be desired to make one wise, she took of its fruit and ate; and she also gave some to her husband, who was with her, and he ate.

Genesis 3:1-6 Evil is crafty in the way it works in our lives. It misrepresents the truth. It tries to make good look bad and bad look good. It manipulates what we think and how we think. Evil asks questions that mislead and then uses the answers to promote its own agenda. One can see evil at work in all of these ways in the Genesis story of the fall of humankind. Eve and Adam were manipulated by the serpent's craftiness to rebel against God.

Evil is still at work today. The best defenses against it are an educated mind and a pure heart. Evil acts like it wants one to know the facts but it really wants to pervert the facts to achieve its own end. Evil tries to corrupt

> the heart by introducing some kind of incentive. It may be a reward such as was the case in Genesis story or it may be the avoidance of something negative.

The answer always requires hard work and discipline. We must work hard at discerning the truth and pray for pure hearts that will follow and proclaim it.

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
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Righteousness As the Thanksgiving holiday approaches,
