

The Blue Jay gridders had another outstanding season, compiling an 8-3 record en route to a second place finish in the tough Mid-Continent League behind state champion Smith Center, a District championship, Bi-District championship and Regional runnerup.

Following a carry-in meal, Coach Bruce Graber introduced the team and made comments to the crowd about each player as he called them forward.

Coach Graber also presented individual awards, which had been voted upon by the coaches and players.

By vote of his teammates, senior lineman Blake Hillebrand received the "Most Inspirational Player" award, the most prestigious of all the awards.

Pittsburg to host playoff game

No. 1 nationally ranked Pittsburg State University, who is quarterbacked by Norton senior Neal Philpot, will host No. 14 ranked University of North Dakota in the semi-finals of the NCAA Division II playoffs on Saturday at Brandenburg Field/ Carnie Smith Stadium in Pittsburg.

The winner will advance to the 2004 Division II National Championship game on Saturday, Dec. 11, in Florence, Ala.

The Gorillas, champions of the Mid-America Intercollegiate Athletics Association, posted a 50-36 victory over fourth-ranked Northwest Missouri State University in the quarterfinals last Saturday in Pittsburg.

Pittsburg State trailed 23-21 at halftime of the Northwest Missouri game. In the second half, a 10 yard touchdown pass from Philpot to Mike Warren gave the Gorillas a 36-29 lead. Pitt State put the game away in the fourth quarter when Philpot ran 25 yards to score.

Philpot rushed for a game-high 131 yards and passed for 50 in the game.

Pittsburg State extended its perfect record to 13-0. They are the only remaining undefeated team in Division II. After earning a bye in the first round of the 24-team playoffs, the Gorillas rolled to a 70-35 second-round win over fifth-ranked Colorado School of Mines on Nov. 20.

North Dakota rallied in the fourth quarter to defeat 15thranked Grand Valley State University, the two-time defending na-

tional champion, by a 19-15 score in the quarterfinals last Saturday. North Dakota, last season's national runner-up, defeated 17thranked St. Cloud State University 20-17 in overtime on Nov. 13, then bested ninth-ranked Michigan Tech University 20-3 on Nov. 20 to advance to the quarterfinals.

With its 50-point output against Northwest Missouri, the Pitt State erage of 105.4 yards and passed for offense became the most prolific scoring offense in the history of NCAA football (all divisions). The Gorillas have scored 775 points in 13 games (59.6 ppg), bettering an 118-year-old mark set by Harvard University in 1886 when they scored 765 points in 14

Pitt State also leads the division in rushing with an average of 373.3 yards per game and total offense with 629.5 yards per contest. The Gorillas have compiled 8,183 yards of total offense this season.

Philpot, who is 6-foot, 4-inches and weighs 254 pounds, is averaging 256.8 yards per game of total offense. He has rushed for an avan average of 151.5. He has compiled 2,825 yards of total offense this season, despite missing two games and parts of others due to
