Alice Loughry, 68, Norton resident, died Tuesday in Satanta.

Mrs. Loughry was born March 3, 1936, in Walla Walla, Wash., the daughter of Alfred H. and Pearl Van Sickler.

In 1941, she and her parents moved to Norcat, where she graduated from high school in 1954. Upon graduation, she attended Brown-Mackie Business School in Salina.

In 1960, she married Darwin A. Loughry in Norton, where they lived and raised their family. Mr. Loughry died April 5, 1983.

She was a homemaker, former owner-operator of a Towntan and Country Kitchen, and a dietitian at the Andbe Home, where she retired after 15 years.

She was preceded in death by her parents, her husband and a grandson, Johnathan.
