City council hires new police officer

The Norton City Council hired another police officer Wednesday night, bringing the Norton Police Department back up to

When probationary officer Jeff Rydquist employment was terminated last month, it left the department with a vacancy.

Assistant Police Chief Toby Kuhn said rather than having another application process, the department took another look at the people who had applied for the position the last time it was open.

He said one candidate looked good. Asa Stiles, a recent graduate of Fort Hays State University in criminal justice, was asked to come in for an interview.

Officer Kuhn said Mr. Stiles was interviewed twice and looked like a good person for the job. He said a background check had been done as well.

"It was pretty much unanimous," he said about the new officer's interviews. City Clerk Darla Ellis, who was on the

interview board, said Mr. Stiles tested well before, but didn't take the job earlier because he wanted to finish his degree. Councilman Ron Briery asked if Mr.

Stiles was going to stay at the Norton Police Department for awhile.

Councilwoman Elaine Mann understood Mr. Briery's concern.

"We hate to hire someone and send them to training just to have them leave in six months or a year," she said. Officer Kuhn said Mr. Stiles has per-

sonal reasons for wanting to live in 'That's hard to tell," he said about Mr.

Briery's question. "I'd love to be able to tell you that he'll be on the force for 25 years and retire here, but I just can't do that. I do think he'll be here for awhile

County questions health, environment letter about landfill

By VERONICA MONIER

Norton County has received a couple of Health and Environment about the small arid landfill that it is building.

Solid Waste Supervisor Curt Archibald said John Mills from Geocore, the company that drilled the landfill's new water testing wells, submitted a Sampling and Analysis Plan, which is now a requirement. But, he said, the plan needs a few corrections for it to be approved.

The plan is new, he said, and is being grandfathered in.

 $Commissioner John\,Miller\,asked\,if\,the$ new plan would affect the agreements made on the county's other wells. He said before, the state was making the county test its wells every quarter, but that it got dropped down to every six months.

"So now we have to come up with a new plan," he said, "incorporating the two new wells. We need to make sure the new plan says draft. Or else they (the state) could make us do some things that they haven't said yet."

Mr. Archibald said mainly the corrections needed were wording changes.

"It's just corrections they want done with the sampling," he said. "How they want it handled."

Mr. Miller wanted to know if the new plan would include just the new wells, or all of the county's wells.

"They are not clear in here under this new plan how it is going to affect sampling on all of our other wells," he said. "If we sign this new agreement, does it mean that our previous agreements are

"I just want to make sure that in signing a new agreement, we don't trip over ourselves. That they don't come back and say well you signed this new agreement and all of your wells come under this new

"We need to have this clarified. Or else letters from the Kansas Department of it could cost us a terrible amount of money.'

Mr. Miller said at the moment, the

county was sampling six of its 15 wells. Commissioner Leroy Lang said that Sebelius and Pat Cox from BG Consultsampling the six wells twice a year was costing the county about \$14,000 a year.

Mr. Miller asked Mr. Archibald to
