"We determined this way we could deliver better service to more people, using modern technology like the toll-free number and computer access," she said.

She said that a lot of federal regulations which once required face-to-face meetings have been changed. Now, people can apply over the phone, or by using the com-

puter or mail, and then someone can call them back.

"It all came together in the decision," she said, "but primarily, it was so we could have the necessary staff needed to provide services."

Ms. Farrell said Phillipsburg was chosen for the regional center because more services were being used there, it was a business hub, and it is a more central location to the counties around it. The center will cover Norton, Phillips, Smith, Graham, Rooks and Osborne counties.

Sheriff's office needs employees

Sheriff Troy Thomson is looking for help and worried that he will have trouble finding people.

The sheriff has a dispatcher, Carol Carlin, retiring at the end of April and he will have to replace her.

He said that he wants to start advertising for a new person right away because it takes a while to find someone and train them. Also, he said, he is worried about his

budget since he will have to pay out accrued but untaken vacation and sick hours for Mrs. Carlin plus pay the new person. The position will be midnight to 8 a.m.,

he said, and pay a little under \$8 an hour The sheriff said he has also lost a

deputy, who is moving to the Kansas City area to be nearer his children. Sheriff talked to commissioners about hiring problems. It's hard to hire new

people because of the pay scale, he said. "I want to hire someone who will live here for more than a year or two," he said.

"I don't want to hire someone who's looking to get his foot in the door."

While the employees get a cost of living increase each year it doesn't include upward movement in pay for many departments. People who would take a job for \$8 an hour a few years ago will not take anything under \$10 an hour now. If someone is hired for that amount it puts them in a higher bracket than those people who have been working for the county in that department for several years.

Shift differential is also a problem, he said. People who work the late shifts get a little bit more at the end of the month but it causes a lot of bookkeeping problems.

The commissioners suggested that the sheriff go ahead and advertise and see how it goes. Sometimes there are people out there who want to live in this area and need a job and sometimes there isn't any-

The sheriff said that his department has been busy.

In Norton County, she said, in 2003, their most current data, there were 27 families needing temporary assistance, 27 using cash assistance, 17 using child care assistance and five needing general assistance. There were 495 Medicaid beneficiaries and 208 people using food stamp assistance.

In Phillips county, she said, the case loads were higher, with 713 Medicaid beneficiaries, 227 people using foods and 34 needing child care assistance.

Public Training on How to Access SRS Services set for February 15, 2005 in Norton County Where SRS Office is Scheduled to Close

NORTON, KANSAS — Public training is scheduled at the Senior Center, 208 W. Main, Norton, Kansas, on Tuesday, February 15, 2005, from 2:00 p.m. to 3:00 p.m. to explain how to access SRS services. The Kansas Department of Social and Rehabilitation Services (SRS) will close the Norton

SRS Office on February 25, 2005. Regional SRS staff worked with community partners in Norton County to establish "access

points" for SRS information and services. Partners agreed to help their community access SRS services by offering space for meetings and interviews; providing access to fax, photocopy, telephone, and computer services. Some will display posters, SRS applications, and other information. Not all services are available at all access points. The following partners agreed to help their community access SRS services:

In addition to setting up access points, SRS implemented a toll-free telephone number so people can reach SRS without long-distance charges. Calls will be answered by staff in the SRS Regional Service Center. The toll-free number is 1-888-369-4777. Also, an internet-based self-assessment tool and application is available at www.srskansas.org; The list of Access Points is also available at www.srskansas.org; click on the Locations button on the left side of the page, then on the county for which you desire information

In the last few years, federal requirements to

receive services have been adjusted. Regular and frequent face-to-face interviews at a local SRS office are not required by regulation in most situations. Child and adult protective services are provided in the homes, making it generally unnecessary to visit an SRS office. It is important for people to know social ser-

vices are still available to them. People can call the toll-free number to talk with SRS staff, or they can visit one of the many access points for information about SRS services. Each current SRS customer will receive instructions for accessing SRS staff and services.
