director to expand and maintain the existing businesses, and taking advantage of the resources of a a lot closer to coming up with a rural community; downtown help existing businesses to thrive, helping those who want to retire find someone to take over their Manager Don Ballek, who is with business, finding each town's strengths and capitalizing on them, and improving the appearance of each community's downtown area; and housing — finding funding, grants and programs to help pay for revitalization of housing, tearing down the houses that are falling down, and rebuilding houses and building apartments, duplexes and fourplexes.

Mr. Ballek said the county and its communities have a tremendous amount of assets.

"There is a lot of opportunity here," he said. "And the cooperation already shown will go a long way toward reaching your goals. I really feel like your three areas of economic development are all worth pursuing.'

Mr. Ballek said it was an ambitious work plan, but the committee is already doing what it needs to do to get things done.

"You basically have the foundation for your vision statement done," he said. "Now all you need to do is write it using the three areas you've chosen.'

He said nothing was set in stone and the committee could change

AN ORDINANCE CONCERNING ALCOHOLIC BEVERAGES WITHIN THE CORPORATE LIMITS OF THE CITY OF NORCATUR, KANSAS,

BE IT ORDAINED by the Governing

Section 1. It shall be unlawful for any person to sell, serve or dispense any cereal malt beverage or alcoholic licensed to sell, serve or dispense such beverage at such public place within or under the jurisdiction of the City of Norcatur or at a public place that is so licensed but does not have a required

Section 2: It shall be unlawful for any malt beverage or alcoholic beverage in any public place not licensed to sell and serve such beverage for public consumption at such public place within or under the jurisdiction of the City of Norcatur or at a public place that is so licensed but does not have a required

Section 3: For the purpose of this section the term "public place" shall include upon any street, public thoroughfare, public parking lot or any privately-owned parking area made available to the public generally, within any parked or driven motor vehicle situated in any of the aforesaid places or upon any property owned by the State of Kansas or any governmental subdivision thereof, unless such
