Blue Jays win second straight state championship!

Medaling nine out of nine wrestlers, Coach Bill Johnson's Norton Community High School wrestling team led from start to finish in the Class 3-2-1A State Wrestling Tournament to win their second championship in a row on Friday and Saturday in Gross Memorial Coliseum in Havs.

This is the first back-to-back state wrestling championships in Norton's long tradition of wrestling excellence.

At the end of the two-day wrestling extravaganza, Norton had compiled 155.5 points to outdistance second place St. Francis by 51.5 points. Following the Indians and their 104 point total was Oakley in third with 90.5. Silver Lake finished in fourth with 84, followed by Smith Center, 82; Hoxie, 76.5; Effingham, 71; Beloit, 59.5; Phillipsburg, 47 and Stockton, 44 in tenth.

Other area teams finished as follows: Trego, 18th with 33.5; Oberlin and Plainville, tied for 21st with 30; Thomas More Prep, 25th with 24.5; Atwood, 28th with 21; Osborne, tied for 39th with 9; Hill City, tied for 47th with 4; Ellis, 55th with 2.5.

Norton had three wrestlers in the championship finals and all three won gold medals.


Junior Clay Madden was the 112-pound champion. Madden repeated as the 112 champion and won the 103-pound championship his freshman season.

Junior Lance Roe won the 152pound title to earn his third state tournament medal. He was fourth at 135 pounds last season and fifth at 135 his freshman year.

Senior Michael Sprigg completed a perfect 37-0 season to win his second straight 275-pound championship. Sprigg is a fourtime state medalist, having placed fourth in the Class 4A state tournament his freshman season and second in 3-2-1A his sophomore season.

Three Blue Jays were in the running for a consolation championship. Sophomore Nathan Broeckelman won the bronze medal at 119 pounds after placing second his freshman season.

Finishing in fourth place were junior Luke Pfannenstiel at 140 pounds and sophomore Logan Keiswetter at 103. Pfannenstiel was injured last season but placed fifth at 112 pounds his freshman season. Keiswetter competed in

Tyler Baker, Hoxie, won the 125-pound championship by pinning Brad Esterl, Beloit, in 4:55. Dylan Loyd, St. Francis, placed third with a 9-3 win over Justin York, Smith Center. Joe Olson, Trego, placed fifth with a 7-3 decision over Jeff Peterson, Oskaloosa.

In the 160-pound division, Nick Newell won the first ever state wrestling championship by a Mankato High School athlete. Mankato has never had a wrestling team but, after three years as a basketball player, Newell decided to wrestle his senior year. He wrestled the season with Beloit but had to wrestle under the Cougar colors at state. He decisioned Jeff Doering, Minneapolis, 8-2 to win the championship and finish the season 35-3.

Courtney Nightengale, Cimarron, placed third with a 9-2 decision over Kyle Spencer, Hesston. Chuck Knapp, Lincoln, placed fifth with an 8-5 decision over Cody Austin, Whitewater-Remington.

Dustin Foster, Sedgwick, completed an undefeated season at 171 pounds with a 4-2 decision over Austin Kingsbury, Smith Center. Foster ended the season with a 34-0 record and Kingsbury ended with a 37-2 record.

Also competing for the first time in the state tournament for Norton were junior twins Jeremy and Jon Harding and sophomore Blake VanEaton. Jeremy placed fifth at 135 and Jon finished in sixth at 130. VanEaton placed sixth at 145.

The Blue Jays compiled an excellent won-loss record of 31-13 and had an outstanding pin ratio of 13-2 in the tournament.

This was Coach Johnson's 14th season as head wrestling coach at Norton. His teams had placed high in the state tournament for years until the Blue Jays edged defending champion Hoxie for the title last year. It was Norton's first state championship since the Blue Jays won the Class 3A state tournament in 1973. Winning a second straight championship this year to make history at Norton was an "awesome" experience, according to Coach Johnson.

"It is exciting to think that all nine of our wrestlers medaled, equaling last year's medal count," said Coach Johnson.

"I am very pleased with the way our boys wrestled. We practiced hard and were prepared. You can't take performance for granted but everything went like clockwork.

"It was the first time here for several of our wrestlers and they did very well. We had good leadership from Michael Sprigg and the others who had competed previously in the state tournament.

"To show how tough our regional was the week before, 13 of the 28 state championship finalists were from our regional."

Norton also ran away with the championship of the regional tournament that was held in WaKeeney.

"Michael's pin in the finals put the exclamation point on a very good season," said Coach Johnson.


