## State audit helps find more cash from head count

The Norton School Board will re-publish its general fund budget to include just a little bit more

Superintendent Greg Mann said the district predicted that it would have a full-time equivalency enrollment of 1,150.6 students last July. The district came up with that number using last year's enrollment figures to figure the budget.

But, Mr. Mann said, during an annual audit by the Kansas Department of Education, it was found that the district actually had an equivalency of 1,150.8. The 0.2 addition allows the district to claim \$773 more in general fund authority.

"I don't know if it's possible to get closer than that," Mr. Mann

He said republishing the budget will not affect the mill levy or the amount of taxes being paid. He said if the Norton district doesn't claim the money someone else

The only cost to the district will be re-publishing the budget.

The board set a budget hearing for 7:30 p.m. Monday, April 11, during the school board meeting. At that time, the public can comment on re-publishing the budget

In other business, the board:

 Continued participation in the Parents As Teachers program. This year the program is costing the district \$6,648, which is less than expected. The state pays 60 percent of the program's cost. Mr. Mann said the cost will probably go up some next year because of an increase in employees' salaries and benefits.

The vote passed 4-1 with Board member Elaine Lofgreen voting

• Heard that a by-pass on a leaking hot water heater storage tank at Eisenhower seems to be working. Mr. Mann said they decided to just pipe around the storage tank and, because they have not run out way it is. He said they are just going to leave the tank where it is because it would take a lot of unnecessary work and expense to remove it.

• Listened to a presentation on the social studies curriculum by Margaret Moore, a third-grade teacher and a member of the social studies curriculum committee. Mrs. Moore passed out a sample test that is given to the sixth-grade students to help with assessment

• Kept the fee for driver's education at \$50 for in-district students and \$100 for out-of-district students. The Lenora students are considered in district.

 Approved a three-year audit contract with Mapes and Miller of Norton. The cost will increase \$100 each year up to \$5,350 in

• Directed Mr. Mann to use the remaining Tansill construction money, estimated to be \$1,400, to buy technology for the board room. Mr. Mann said he would like to get a television/VCR unit, which will cost about \$200, and would also like to get a computer projector or an electronic whiteboard, which he's estimated

will cost about \$1,200. Took no action on a contract with the Jennings School District. Mr. Mann said the Norton district is already enrolling a number of Jennings students who live close

enough. He said students who wanted to come to Norton will do so without the need of a contract.

• Went into three closed sessions lasting 50 minutes altogether to talk about non-elected personnel.
