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Ladies' head vases are once again all the rage

Isn't it a pleasure to see hats coming back into vogue?

Easter, in earlier years, involved shopping for a special hat to celebrate the holiest day of the church year. Even when a new hat was an economic impossibility, no woman appeared in church with an uncovered head. A few artificial flowers or a new ribbon or two must be somehow squeezed from the egg money to refurbish an old

Hats figure largely in the design of one of the most popular collectibles around — that of head

At a recent auction it became apparent that those who saved these once common floral containers are now in possession of quite a valuable asset. Out of a dozen lovely lady vases sold, only one went for under \$85, most brought over \$100 and one or two garnered twice that much with enthusiastic bidding all around.

Vases molded in the shape of beautiful women's heads were commonly used by florists only a few years ago. Most homes had one tucked up on a shelf someplace because they were too pretty not to keep even after the flower arrangement wilted.

While there were a few American manufacturers that produced this florist ware, almost all head vases were imported from Japan.

Most are unmarked because they carried paper stickers that peeled away with time, but the manufacturer has little to do with value in this collectible category. Here the condition of the vase and the originality of design are of Collector Chat Liza Deines

paramount importance.

Elaborate hairdos featuring pompadours or cascading ringlets and abundant waves crown daintily pretty faces.

Perched atop these fancy coiffures are truly spectacular hats. Straw boaters with trailing ribbons, velvet bonnets with feather plumes, sunbonnets tied under the chin, perky pillboxes, or clusters of flowers adorn our ladies who smile demurely, secure in the assurance that they were the height of fashion.

Impossibly luscious eyelashes flutter against rosy cheeks as the ladies glance downward, have both eyes softly closed or wink flirtatiously.

Many wear tiny pearl earrings attached to their china ears with little wire loops; some hold a delicate hand to their face, perhaps with a glittering ring embellishing it, or sometimes gloved in pastel mitts with ruffles. Pearl necklaces, high lacy collars, buttons and bows all serve to decorate wherever possible.

A very rare example holds a beautiful parasol aloft, another cuddles a kitten to her pink cheek. Equally rare are a nun's head with folded hands, and a sweet baby face whose chubby hand clutches a rattle.

Look for the Oriental lady,

Jackie Kennedy or Uncle Sam. One famous vase resembles Marilyn Monroe. It is usually seen in ivory and gold, head turned seductively to the side, featuring closed eyes and a sleek, chic upswept hairdo.

There were even a few gentlemen head vases produced and one with a lady and a gentleman cheekto-cheek. A limited run of very small heads did not prove popular, nor did unusually large ones, but they do make nice additions to a comprehensive collection.

may not detract from the attractiveness of the piece, but they do devalue it for a collector. Models with individually molded eyelashes are most susceptible to damage and so are very valuable when intact. Be persnickety and look closely at any prospective purchase before

you invest, but never pass up that sweet face that moves your heart. Almost every one makes me sigh with delight, damage notwithstanding.
