Robert Neil Seeley, 87, who was raised in Norton, died March 27 at Columbine Care Center West, Fort Collins, Colo.

Mr. Seeley was born Christmas Day, 1917, in Enid, Okla., to Edwin E. and Josephine (Ellis) Seeley. The family moved to Topeka, but after the death of his mother, when he was 10, he was raised by his grandparents, George B. and Minerva Seeley and his aunt Creta Seeley in Norton.

He graduated in 1942, from Kansas State Teachers College in Emporia, where he was president of the unaffiliated student association.






