They promoted cardiovascular fitness while raising \$8,262.82 for the American Heart Association.



In Kansas, there are rules and regulations for the sale of foods in farmer's markets. Here are a few you should consider before starting a farmer's market or taking some of your products to one:

- Frozen meat is allowed only if processed in state or federal facilities and kept frozen.
- Fresh meat, meat products, poultry and fish are prohibited.

•Eggs must be kept refrigerated. Producers must register with the

• Homemade jams and jellies are allowed. All other home-canned foods are prohibited.

• Foods not deemed potentially hazardous are allowed. These include baked goods like cookies, breads, fruit pies, cakes and cinnamon rolls. Other foods include more information, contact the Kansas Department of Agricul- fruits, vegetables, nuts and honey. county extension office, 877-5755.

 Packaged foods must be properly labeled with the name of the product and the name and address of the producer.







