The Norton County Commissioners met with representatives of Developmental Services of Northwest Kansas Monday afternoon.

Retiring President Jim Blume told the commissioners it was the last time he would be meeting with them and introduced them to the new president Jerry Michand. He said Mr. Michand has been with the agency for 15 years.

Mr. Blume said, as a non-profit organization, developmental services usually just squeaks by.


