Landfill to open as soon as road to bottom is finished

The new Norton County landfill will be opened as soon as the new road into the pit is finished and the paperwork is completed.

Representatives of the Kansas Department of Health and Environment were out last week to inspect the facility and they told county commissioners that the site looked good.

However, the road into the bottom of the pit is still being finished. The pit was originally designed by the engineers to have trucks dump from the top but the commissioners and Solid Waste Supervisor Curt Archibald said they thought that would allow too much trash to blow away. To combat the blowing problem the trucks will dump at the bottom of the pit.

Mr. Archibald told the commissioners at their meeting on Monday that asphalt millings are being put on the road to keep it from getting too muddy.


He also told the commissioners that GeoCore, the company which tests monitoring wells for contaminates at the landfill, wants a new contract because the county has added three new wells to comply with state requirements. That brings the county up to nine monitoring wells at the new dump site.

GeoCore is asking for \$5,300 plus \$1,000 in extra costs each time it tests the wells. The company has been testing the county's wells for \$3,900 plus extras each six months.

The commissioners asked that Mr. Archibald look to see if there is anyone else doing testing on wells.

In other business, the commissioners: ·Learned that Mr. Archibald has had to call on a consultant to fix an apparent bug in the new computer program in use at the landfill.
