Museum rep speaks to club

Representing the Norton Historical Society, Joe Ballinger spoke to the Norton Lions Club Tuesday.

"Most of us think we're too young to be part of history," Mr. Ballinger said. "Until we see old football team pictures or aviation pictures — and we're in them."

Mr. Ballinger said the society originated in 1974, and was incorporated in 1983. The society bought the old Norton Library from the county in 1993, for \$1. He credits a lot of the recording of Norton's history to Marjorie Mills a long-time Norton elementary school teacher who maintained over 60 years of scrapbooks. He added that Lydia Bishop, a prominent member of the community, compiled histories of many aspects of Norton life.

He said the museum houses many artifacts including Indian artifacts discovered in 1882. On display are bones and tusks. Mr. Ballinger said at the Norton Mu-

seum, those displays are touchable.

He said the museum contains the history of frontier times. He said the little settlement of Devises is one of 39 ghost towns in the county.

Some of the items on display include the first television set in the county donated by the Eppinger family; a 120-year old chair from the Champion family; and Glenn Tweed's extensive Lions Club memorabilia.

Mr. Ballinger encouraged individuals and organizations to become supporting members of the museum.

The museum will be open from 2 to 4 p.m. every Wednesday and Saturday until the last of October. He said volunteers are needed to help conduct private tours during the days the museum is closed.

In other business the Lions Club:

- Installed new officers.
- Were reminded of the cemetery fence project scheduled for July 9.
- Were encouraged to volunteer to help operate the Scrambler at Norton County Fair.
