

Norton Legion played in Goodland Tournament

The Norton American Legion baseball team played three games, one shortened by weather, and had a fourth canceled after half an inning due to weather in the Goodland Tournament on Friday, Saturday and Sunday.

BURLINGTON
Norton lost 5-0 to Burlington, Colo., in the first tournament game. The game was called after six innings due to a storm.

Burlington scored one run in each of the first three innings, then added two in the fourth.

Norton had six hits. Chris Davis and Denton Bailey were leading hitters for Norton, each with two singles in three times at bat.
