Talk about a transition — the "Transitions in Quilting" exhibition came down and "Whispers From the Walls: The Art of Whitfield Lovell" has gone up.

This poignant and highly provocative installation exhibit consists of an replica of a 1920s oneroom shack, which served as home to African-Americans of the South during that time.

Mr. Lovell has used found ob- 18. jects, photographs, wall drawings and sound to create a sensory experience.

The exhibit began to take shape on Tuesday as five men put their

backs into setting up the floors, walls and ceiling to this dingy reproduction of "home".

Rolls of felt paper were placed around the shack and covered with shredded cedar for an added effect. Clothes have been strewn about the gallery floor beneath charcoal drawings that seem to resurrect the anonymous people who may have lived here. Open for viewing, "Whispers" will run through Sept.

Also in the gallery corner, is Bruce Bitter's metal work. Mr. Bitter captured one of the "Artist of the Month" titles at last year's crafts fair and now displays his fine craftsmanship through July.

Cold can vary with retrigerators

Refrigerator thermostats aren't always reliable.

Signals to buy a thermometer to check "fridge" temperatures include milk that starts smelling sour before the family can drink it or lettuce that gets too cold and freezes.

Refrigerator temperatures should register 34 to 40 degrees Farenheit. In this range, the bacteria that spoils food will grow Below 32 degrees, of course,

food freezes. Bacteria survives, but will not grow.

Here are some additional tips for refrigerating food safely:

• Make quick food choices when opening the door, so the food inside stays cold.

• Don't pack the refrigerator too

• Keep foods covered to keep from drying out and flavors from mixing.

• Store raw meat, fish and poultry on a plate or in plastic bags so juices can't drip onto other foods.

• If you have them, use the compartment for vegetables to keep them crisp and the one for meats to help the meats stay fresh longer.

• If you don't have a compartment, store meats on the lowest shelf in the refrigerator (the cold-

• Store eggs in their original carton, not the refrigerator door (where the temperature varies

• Keep leftovers near the front of the refrigerator, so you'll see and use them within three or four days.

• Keep shelves clean, and toss any food that exceeds its use-by date or becomes moldy.
