# **Cyclists** pedal to coast

#### By CYNTHIA HAYNES

Ten cyclists going from San Francisco to Washington passed through Norton Wednesday as they pedaled from Oberlin to Phillipsburg.

The Bike-Aid team, nine riders and a truck, is on "a mission of peace and justice," trying to bring the world a little closed together, said James Duncan of Denver.

The riders take turns driving the rental van, which is packed with food, water and equipment. Wednesday, Nicolas Bell of Alameda, Calif., was driving.
